Lesson 29 - I Love My Family

Aim

To learn that every person in a family is important to know that God loves each family member

Materials

- * Story 'The Berenstain Bears and Baby makes Five', by Stan & Jan Berenstain
- * Action song 'I Love all my Family'
- line drawings of mother, father, brother, sister and baby
- red card, glue, scissors,
- * Children's pictures of themselves when they were a baby.
- * pictures of cute babies

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1) Introduction

Ask children to show you their pictures of when they were babies. Talk about each child's family. How many are there in your family? Do you have a baby brother or sister? Is your Mummy going to have another baby? Would you like to have a new baby brother or baby sister? Today's story is about a Bear family: Papa Bear, Mama bear, Brother Bear, Sister Bear and the new Baby Bear

2) Story & Discussion

* <u>The Berenstain Bears and Baby makes Five</u> - Sister Bear is not happy, because the new baby gets all the attention. When she draws a picture of her family for homework, she misses out the baby. Mother bear decides to show a video recording of when Sister was a baby, to remind Sister that she was a baby once. After the video Sister no longer feels upset, but is very happy to have a baby sister.

* Discussion

- Why was sister not happy with the baby?
- What made her change her mind?
- Do you remember when someone was a baby in your family?
- Do you think it is nice to have a baby in the family ?

- What is sometimes difficult?
- Remind the children that like Baby Bear, each of them was a baby once.

God loves each person in a family. When we love each other, God wants to be with us. Of all the members of a family, the baby needs the most love and attention. They can't do anything by themselves. God also made babies to be very cute and easy to love. Having a baby brother or sister can be a lot of fun

3) Action Song.

<u>I Love all My Family</u> - This action song reminds children that family members should love each other. The hearts can be made before the lesson and hidden in the room, or they can be made by the children as a craft activity first.

And the fuss they made when the baby did the least little thing.



"Will you excuse me a minute?" Sister said when the last video had ended.


"I suppose so," said Mama as she watched Sister scurry up the stairs and into her room.

I Love All My Family



This action song reminds children that family members should love each other.

PREPARATION

For each child, cut one or two 15 cm wide hearts from red card. Copy the pictures of family members several times, as needed, and cut them apart. Glue one picture inside each heart. Before the children arrive, hide the hearts around the room in obvious places.

HOW TO PLAY

1. Have the children look for the hearts until each child has found one. As they find a heart, they may join you, sitting in a circle. When all children are seated, discuss the pictures on the hearts (daddy, mummy, sister, brother and baby).

2. Sing I LOVE ALL MY F AMILY to the tune of TWINKLE, TWINKLE, LITTLE STAR. Let those children who have a picture of daddy stand and hold up their hearts during the song.

3. Ask, "What good things does Daddy do for you to show you he loves you?" Allow time for children to respond. Then ask, "What can you do for Daddy to show him you love him?"

4. Repeat the game, letting children with the other pictures stand. On the remaining verses substitute Mummy, Sister, Brother, and then Baby for the word "Daddy." Continue playing until each family member has been mentioned or as long as children are enjoying the game.
